SC African American Heritage Commission Historical Marker Funding Program

The South Carolina African American Heritage Commission is offering a new program to fund state historical markers that focus on African American historic places during state fiscal year FY23-24. Between 15 and 20 applications will be eligible to have the cost of the marker paid for by the SC African American Heritage Commission. FY24 Federal Historic Preservation Fund Grant Applications: Due April 30, 2024

Applications and instructions for the FY 2024 federal Historic Preservation Fund subgrants are now available at <u>this link</u>. Administered by the SHPO, these matching grants can assist two types of projects:

• *Survey and Planning Projects*—eligible projects include surveys of historic properties, National Register nominations, preservation education, and preservation planning.

• **Stabilization Projects**—eligible projects include stabilizing historic buildings or protecting historic buildings from the adverse effects of the weather. Stabilization Projects are limited to projects located in South Carolina's Certified Local Government (CLG) communities.

Any local government, non-profit, or institution in South Carolina may apply for a Survey and Planning Project. Local governments, non-profits and institutions located in a CLG community may also apply for a Stabilization Project. At least ten percent of the state's annual allocation from the National Park Service must be awarded to CLGs. Grant awards generally range from \$2,500 to \$35,000. Applications will be accepted until 5:00 PM, on Tuesday, April 30, 2024. Please contact Brad Sauls at 803-896-6172, or <u>bsauls@scdah.sc.gov</u> to discuss your project before you apply.

State Board of Review Approves 5 Nominations

The State Board of Review for the National Register of Historic Places met March 22, 2024 and approved the following nominations:

- Ocean Grove School, Aiken County
- Darlington Theatre, Darlington, Darlington County
- Latimer High and Elementary School, Latta, Dillon County
- Holy Cross Faith Memorial School, Pawleys Island, Georgetown County
- State Theatre, Greenwood, Greenwood County

The SHPO will forward the nominations to the Keeper of the National Register at the National Park Service in Washington, DC who makes the final decision about listing the properties in the National Register. Tax Credit Spotlight

This month's spotlight features a c. 1929 (with a c. 1949 addition), 2-story masonry powerhouse building in the Rock Hill Printing and Finishing Company historic district. The project provided retail and office space on the first floor and four apartments on the second floor. The tax credit applicant invested \$18.415 million in rehabilitation expenditures, earning \$3.683 million in federal tax credits and \$1.8415 in state income tax credits. According to the applicant, "Rehabilitation projects such as those at The Rock Hill Printing & Finishing Company, serve as much needed catalysts for cultural and economic revitalization of the surrounding area... A final point that cannot be emphasized enough – none of this work would have been economically feasible without ample, unconventional financing tools – chief among them, the State and Federal historic rehabilitation tax incentive programs. Our partners at the South Carolina SHPO and the National Park Service truly took to heart the physical and financial challenges we faced... Given the particularly challenging nature of this project, our counterparts made themselves even more accessible than usual, to brainstorm design solutions in realtime. There was a genuinely held appreciation that a collaborative approach between the design team and the preservation officers was the best way to achieve remarkable results in a workable timeframe." April 17/June 28, 2024 SC State Historical Records Advisory Board (SHRAB) Grant. SHRAB, with assistance from SCDAH, has been awarded \$80,000 in federal grant funds to conduct a historical records regrant project. Local governments, historical records repositories, and non-profits in SC that preserve and/or provide access to SC's historical records or support the state's archival community in education and training can apply for grant funding with special consideration to traditionally underserved institutions and collections, especially those focusing on SC African American and Native American history and rural areas of the state.

The SHRAB is accepting Letters of Intent by April 17, 2024, and grant applications until June 28, 2024. Grant applicants are also required to attend a virtual Information Session. The grant guidelines, application and further information is available on the SCDAH <u>website</u>.

Monthly, SC Humanities Council Mini Grants. SC Humanities awards Mini Grants to support public humanities programs of modest cost, with awards of \$5,000 or less.
