
Modjeska Simkins House










Horry-Guignard House & Dependency Constructed circa 1813



THE TALL DELICATION SCALE

The Guignard-Horry Residence.

A very old house stands of the northwest corner of Senate and Pickns street. It was owned by Survevor-General John Gabriel Guignard, who moved to Columbia from Stateburg shortly after his appointment in 1789. Just how soon he occupied this house is not known. But we do know that he was living there in 1813, because the Guignard family have an insurance policy on this house bearing that date. Gen. Peter Horry. who married Mr. Guignard's sister, Frances, also lived there. This house is now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Taylor.







Taylor House Constructed circa 1908

















"Fine Colonial Residence, Pendleton Street, Columbia, SC" [1911]. – NOT!



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MOVING OLD RESIDENCE TO MAKE ROOM FOR NEW

Historic Old Place at the Corner of Bull and Senate Streets Removed a Half Mile.

To move a house over three-fourths of a century old for nearly a half a mile is no light task, especially when that house is two stories and a half high and is constructed of the old fashioned heavy material for which contractors in those days were famous. That is the task, however, undertaken by Contractor Colson of Spartanburg. who is moving the house at the northeast corner of Bull and Senate streets down Bull street for nearly five blocks. The house is now in the middle of the street and electric light poles, telgraph poles and all other obstructions are moved to one side temporarily while the great frame building is being pushed down the street. Contractor Colson expects to have it on the lot set aside for its use in about a week.

The house is the property of Mr. Thomas Taylor, as is the lot upon which the house will soon stand. On the lot at the corner of Bull and Senate street will be erected one of the handsomest dwellings in the city. Mr. Taylor, however, did not wish to tear down this splendidly built old house and accordingly he contracted to have it moved intact and with all of the severe strain to which it has been subjected not a crack has shown in the walls.

The house was erected about 1825 and was originally one story in height, the additions being made later. It was sold in 1839 by James S. Guignard to his daughter, Frances Ann Margaret Rorry Myrant, who in turn sold it to W. M. Burr many years later. Afterwards Dr. R. W. Gibbes purchased it and he sold it to Mr. Taylor. The basements of the house were constructed almost entirely of mud and brick and the heavy timbers supporting it were rough hewn and not dressed. Attempts to saw some of the timber resulted in several saws being ruined and the timbers are as sound today as when they were first placed in position.

WAS THE LAW THEN VIOLATED?

Prof. Andrew C. Moore, One of the Members of the Commission, Decries the Act.

By the special request of a gentleman who takes a deep interest in whatever concerns the welfare of the city the writer will explain why the trees were taken down in front and on the side of Mr. Taylor's new residence. The question of removing them received the most earnest and careful attention on the part of the commission, in fact being held in abeyance for several months, and after viewing the situation from every possible standpoint it was thought best for them to be removed. A few of them were in fairly good condition, but there was no possibility of their ever making fine trees, and this being the case it was deemed best for the future beauty of the street for them to be removed. making it possible thereby to put young trees in their place. In addition to this it was thought necessary to lower the sidewalk, it being very high just on that part of the street and this could not, of course, be done while the trees were standing.


