Tax Credit Spotlight

This month's spotlight features a 2-1/2 story residence in the Charleston Historic District (see photograph). The John N. Tiedeman House was constructed shortly after the Civil War c. 1870. This Charleston single house includes Greek Revival features like a closed gable end roof, Tuscan columns on the two-story piazza, and six-over-six double hung sash windows. The piazza screen features an Italianate style hood and brackets over the door. The current owners recently completed a rehabilitation project that included repairs to the existing terne metal roof, structural repairs to the piazzas, repairs to the existing windows and doors, exterior siding repairs, and new exterior paint. Upon completing the project, owner Nancy Feinburg stated "bringing the John N. Tiedeman house back to structural good health while keeping its original design and historic beauty has been a very satisfying experience". The rehabilitation of this 19th-century Charleston house was completed in 2018 with the use of the state homeowner historic rehabilitation tax credit. National Park Service Seeks Feedback on Historic Preservation Certification Application

The National Park Service (NPS) is seeking feedback on Historic Preservation Certification Application, NPS Forms 10-168, 10-168a, 10-168b, 10-168c, 10-168d and 10-168e. NPS seeks comments on the forms, focusing on an effort to reduce paperwork and respondent burden, as required by the Paperwork Reduction Act of 1995. Information collected in the Historic Preservation Certification Application is used by NPS to evaluate the condition and historic significance of buildings undergoing rehabilitation, and to evaluate whether or not the rehabilitation work meets the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation. The certifications are necessary for an applicant to receive historic tax credits. **The comment period is open until September 3, 2019.** Learn more about the [published notice](#) and submit your feedback.
