# Historic Preservation State Grant Fund Applications: Due September 24, 2025



#### HISTORIC PRESERVATION STATE GRANT FUND APPLICATION

The State Historic Preservation Office is now accepting applications for the Historic Preservation State Grant Fund for FY 25-26. The purpose of the State Grant Fund is to support historic preservation projects that benefit local communities through the physical repair and rehabilitation of South Carolina's historic buildings.

This year applicants may apply for either a**Planning Grant** to develop "bid-ready" plans and specifications OR a **Stabilization Grant** to assist with historic building stabilization and weatherization projects.




# 2026 SCAAHC Annual Conference Call for Proposals

## **Upcoming Grant Application Deadlines**

NEW August 21, 2025 Paul Bruhn Historic Revitalization Subgrant Program. The National Park Service is accepting applications for the FY2024 Paul Bruhn Historic Revitalization Subgrant Program. Recipients will fund programs that support the rehabilitation of historic properties (listed in or eligible for the National Register of Historic Places) and foster economic development in rural communities (populations less than 50,000 in the 2020 U.S. Census). Eligible applicants are States, Tribes, Certified Local Governments, special district governments, and non-profits, who will select, fund, and manage preservation projects for historic properties to include architectural/engineering services and physical preservation. The Notice of Funding Opportunity is available on grants.gov under opportunity number P24AS00548.

**NEW September 12, 2025 Preserving Black Churches Grant.** The African American Cultural Heritage Action Fund is accepting applications for grants (between \$50,000 - \$500,000) to preserve historic houses of worship (those with active congregations or that are being repurposed for new uses within the community) and advance preservation activities including capital projects, programming and interpretation, capacity building, project planning, and endowment and financial sustainability.
