FY23 Federal Historic Preservation Fund Grant Applications: Due April 27

Applications and instructions for the FY 2023 federal Historic Preservation Fund subgrants are now available at <a href="https://scdah.sc.gov/historic-preservation/programs/grants">https://scdah.sc.gov/historic-preservation/programs/grants</a>. Administered by the SHPO, these matching grants can assist two types of projects:

- *Survey and Planning Projects*—eligible projects include surveys of historic properties, National Register nominations, preservation education, and preservation planning.
- Stabilization Projects—eligible projects include stabilizing historic buildings or protecting historic buildings from the adverse effects of the weather. Stabilization Projects are limited to projects located in South Carolina's Certified Local Government (CLG) communities.

Any local government, non-profit, or institution in South Carolina may apply for a Survey and Planning Project. Local governments, non-profits and institutions located in a CLG community may also apply for a Stabilization Project. At least ten percent of the state's annual allocation from the National Park Service must be awarded to CLGs. Grant awards generally range from \$2,500 to \$35,000. Applications will be accepted until 5:00 PM, on Thursday, April 27, 2023. #### 2023 SC Historic Preservation Awards Call for Nominations

#### Dan Elswick Retires from SHPO

Dan Elswick, who served as senior historic architecture consultant with the State Historic Preservation Office since 1986 has recently retired. During his career Dan had a significant impact influence on the rehabilitation of hundreds of historic buildings as well as the state's preservation policies and programs. Dan facilitated hundreds of federal historic income tax credit projects from historic downtown commercial buildings to historic schools and historic textile mills, representing over \$1 billion invested in successfully completed rehabilitation projects. He also generously shared his knowledge with countless property owners, architects, contractors, students, and design review board members and staff, perhaps most memorably as the "Building Doctor" donning white coat and making "house calls" to offer advice to property owners. Dan was recognized with the 2012 National Historic Preservation Award in the State Historic Preservation Office category by the Secretary of the Interior, and more recently with a Lifetime Achievement Award from Historic Columbia in 2020.

#### **Grant Application Deadlines**

February 28, 2023 Preservation Technology and Training Grants (PTT Grants). The PTT Grants are administered by the National Center for Preservation Technology and Training (NCPTT), the National Park Service's innovation center for the preservation community. The competitive grants program provides funding to federal agencies, states, tribes, local governments, and non-profit organizations to support the following activities: Innovative research that develops new technologies or adapts existing technologies to preserve cultural resources (typically \$20,000) Specialized workshops or symposia that identify and address national preservation needs (typically \$15,000 to \$20,000) How-to videos, mobile applications, podcasts, best practices publications, or webinars that disseminate practical preservation methods or provide better tools for preservation practice (typically \$5,000 to \$15,000). The maximum grant award is \$20,000. The actual grant award amount is dependent on the scope of the proposed activity. NCPTT does not fund "brick and mortar" grants. More information on the grant can be found in the Notice of Funding Opportunity.

March 31, 2023 Hometown Grants. T-Mobile has created a grant program to award up to \$50,000 to grantees to building, rebuild or refresh community spaces.
