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# Historic Preservation State Grant Fund Applications Due January 31, 2023

The South Carolina Department of Archives & History is accepting applications for the new Historic Preservation State Grant Fund. The purpose of the State Grant Fund is to support historic preservation projects that benefit local communities through the physical repair and rehabilitation of South Carolina's historic buildings. Eligible applicants are nonprofit organizations and institutions, local governments, and federal or state recognized Native American tribes.

Grants ranging from \$40,000 to \$200,000 will be awarded for the stabilization and weatherization of historic buildings. A minimum 20% cash match of the Total Project Cost is required. Buildings must be listed as a contributing resource in a National Register of Historic Places historic district or individually listed in or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. Project work must meet the <u>Secretary of the Interior's</u> <u>Standards for Rehabilitation</u>. The application deadline for the 2023 applications is 5:00 PM on January 31, 2023. 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FY23 Federal Historic Preservation Fund Grant Applications Now Available

Applications and instructions for the FY 2023 federal Historic Preservation Fund subgrants are now available at <a href="https://scdah.sc.gov/historic-preservation/programs/grants">https://scdah.sc.gov/historic-preservation/programs/grants</a>. Administered by the SHPO, these matching grants can assist two types of projects:

- *Survey and Planning Projects*—eligible projects include surveys of historic properties, National Register nominations, preservation education, and preservation planning.
- **Stabilization Projects**—eligible projects include stabilizing historic buildings or protecting historic buildings from the adverse effects of the weather. Stabilization Projects are limited to projects located in South Carolina's <u>Certified Local Government (CLG) communities</u>.

Any local government, non-profit, or institution in South Carolina may apply for a Survey and Planning Project. Local governments, non-profits and institutions located in a CLG community may also apply for a Stabilization Project. At least ten percent of the state's annual allocation from the National Park Service must be awarded to CLGs. Grant awards generally range from \$2,500 to \$35,000. Applications will be accepted until 5:00 PM, on Thursday, April 27, 2023. Please contact Brad Sauls at 803-896-6172, or <u>bsauls@scdah.sc.gov</u> to discuss your project before you apply.

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# Tax Credit Spotlight

This month's spotlight features a c. 1920 two-story, Colonial Revival residence in Greenville that is individually eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places for its locally significant Rustic architecture and construction method of facing the exterior with undressed rock. From 2020 to 2021, a historic rehabilitation project was completed which earned the homeowners a state income tax credit equal to 25% of eligible expenses. The rehabilitation of the property included sensitively cleaning the stonework using the gentlest means possible; replacing the electrical wiring and HVAC system, wood siding deteriorated beyond repair with matching siding, non-historic windows with more appropriate lite-patterns, and the deteriorated roof with a material compatible with the visual character of historic slate; repairing plaster wall finishes and historic windows and doors; restoring hardwood flooring, the east entry portico, the historic kitchen footprint, and fireplaces; and compatible site work. 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## **Grant Application Deadlines**

January 31, 2023 Historic Preservation State Grant Fund. Administered by the SC Department of Archives and History, this new state-funded grant program will award grants ranging from \$40,000 to \$200,000 for the stabilization and weatherization of historic buildings in South Carolina. Eligible applications are nonprofit organizations and institutions, local governments, and federal or state recognized Native American tribes. A minimum 20% cash match of the Total Project Cost is required. Buildings must be listed as a contributing resource in a National Register of Historic Places historic district or individually listed in or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. Project work must meet the <u>Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation</u>. **NEW February 1, 2023 National Trust Preservation Funds**. **February 7, 2023 Paul Bruhn Historic Revitalization Grant Program**. The National Park Service is accepting applications for the FY2022 <u>Paul Bruhn Revitalization Grants Program</u>. The Bruhn program provides recipients (referred to as prime grantees) with a single grant that is then regranted in smaller amounts to individual projects (subgrants) in rural communities. Eligible applicants include nonprofit organizations, Certified Local Governments, State Historic Preservation Offices, and Tribal Historic Preservation Offices. Eligible subgrant properties must be listed in the National Register of Historic Places or determined eligible for listing, and must be located within rural (non-urban) communities with populations less than 50,000 according to the 2020 U.S. Census. **NEW February 28, 2023 Preservation Technology and Training Grants** (PTT Grants). The PTT Grants are administered by the National Center for Preservation Technology and Training (NCPTT), the National Park Service's innovation center for the preservation community. The competitive grants program provides funding to federal agencies, states, tribes, local governments, and non-profit organizations to support the following activities: Innovative research that develops new technologies or adapts existing technologies to preserve cultural resources (typically \$20,000) Specialized workshops or symposia that identify and address national preservation needs (typically \$15,000 to \$20,000) How-to videos, mobile applications, podcasts, best practices publications, or webinars that disseminate practical preservation methods or provide better tools for preservation practice (typically \$5,000 to \$15,000). The maximum grant award is \$20,000. The actual grant award amount is dependent on the scope of the proposed activity. NCPTT does not fund "brick and mortar" grants.
