Applicants will be able to apply for a Planning Grant to develop "bid-ready" plans and specifications OR a Stabilization Grant to assist with historic building stabilization and weatherization projects. Michael Lewis is a professor of Sociology at Christopher Newport University in Newport News, Virginia. He studies historical changes in alcohol regulation in the United States with a particular focus on state regulatory systems. The *Coming of Southern Prohibition* examines South Carolina's state-run liquor dispensary system from 1893-1907.

Tax Credit Spotlight

This month's spotlight features a c. 1936, three-story masonry commercial building in the Conway Downtown Historic District. In 2023, tax credit applicants completed a historic rehabilitation of the building valued at \$2.4

million in qualifying rehabilitation expenses, earning \$480,000 and \$600,000 in state and federal income tax credits, respectively. The rehabilitation provided retail space in the front half of the ground level and apartments in the rear of the first floor and throughout the upper floors. The project included mortar repointing; masonry cleaning; replacement windows and restoring infilled window openings; storefront rehabilitation; roof replacement; preservation of significant interior finishes such as wood flooring, plaster walls (or sheetrock as a substitute replacement material, where the plaster was severely deteriorated), bead board ceilings, pressed metal ceilings, and trim; MEP upgrades; and compatible alterations to the floor plans. Grant Application Deadlines

NEW August 29, 2024 Underrepresented Communities Grant Program. The National Park Service is now accepting applications for the underrepresented communities grant program (P24AS00525) that supports the survey, inventory, and designation of historic properties that are associated with communities currently underrepresented in the National Register of Historic Places and among National Historic Landmarks. Grants are awarded through a competitive process and do not require non-Federal match. Eligible applicants are limited to State Historic Preservation Offices, Federally Recognized Indian Tribes, Alaska Native Villages/Corporations, Native Hawaiian Organizations, Certified Local Governments, and nonprofit organizations. NEW August 20, 2024 History of Equal Rights Grant Program. The National Park Service is accepting applications for \$5 million in grant funding for the History of Equal Rights Grant Program P24AS00529). Eligible costs include: architectural services, historic structure reports, preservation plans, and physical preservation to structures. Grants will be awarded through a competitive process and do not require non-Federal funding match. NEW September 5, 2024 African American Civil Rights Grant Program (AACR). The National Park Service announces availability of grant funding through the African American Civil Rights Grant Program. Congress appropriated \$24 million in FY2024 funding. Grants are available to fund two types of projects. History grants support interpretive and research-based projects, while Preservation grants will fund planning and "bricks and mortar" preservation/conservation work on historic buildings and structures. Governmental, tribal, and nonprofit organizations are eligible to apply. Grants are awarded through a competitive process and do not require non-Federal funding match.
