2024 SC Historic Preservation Awards Call for Nominations: Due April 1, 2024

Nominations for the 2024 South Carolina Historic Preservation Awards are due April 1, 2024. Sponsored by Preservation South Carolina, the SC Department of Archives and History, and the Office of the Governor, the Historic Preservation Awards recognize exceptional accomplishments in the preservation, rehabilitation, and interpretation of South Carolina's architectural and cultural heritage. There are six award categories:

- Honor Awards (up to 5 each year)
- Stewardship Awards (up to 5 each year)
- Preservation Service Awards (up to 5 each year)
- Heritage Tourism Award (1 per year)

- Elected Official Honor Award (1 per year)
- Governor's Award (for lifetime achievement, 1 per year)

FY24 Federal Historic Preservation Fund Grant Applications

Applications and instructions for the FY 2024 federal Historic Preservation Fund subgrants are now available at this link. Administered by the SHPO, these matching grants can assist two types of projects:

- Survey and Planning Projects—eligible projects include surveys of historic properties, National Register nominations, preservation education, and preservation planning.
- Stabilization Projects—eligible projects include stabilizing historic buildings or protecting historic buildings from the adverse effects of the weather. Stabilization Projects are limited to projects located in South Carolina's Certified Local Government (CLG) communities.

Any local government, non-profit, or institution in South Carolina may apply for a Survey and Planning Project. Local governments, non-profits and institutions located in a CLG community may also apply for a Stabilization Project. At least ten percent of the state's annual allocation from the National Park Service must be awarded to CLGs. Grant awards generally range from \$2,500 to \$35,000. Applications will be accepted until 5:00 PM, on Tuesday, April 30, 2024. Please contact Brad Sauls at 803-896-6172, or bsauls@scdah.sc.gov to discuss your project before you apply.

SC African American Heritage Commission Historical Marker Funding Program

The South Carolina African American Heritage Commission is offering a new program to fund state historical markers that focus on African American historic places during state fiscal year FY23-24. Between 15 and 20 applications will be eligible to have the cost of the marker paid for by the SC African American Heritage Commission. The Commission will be listed as a co-sponsor of the marker along with the sponsoring organization. More information about the program and how to apply can be found in the program announcement. Economic Impact Study on Historic Preservation in Columbia

Historic Columbia recently completed a study on the economic impact of historic preservation programs in the City of Columbia. Prepared by PlaceEconomics, the study examined the impacts of local historic districts on housing prices, the local property tax special assessment program, and heritage tourism. The study found that "The economic impacts of preservation in Columbia, South Carolina, extend far beyond the realms of architecture and history, and extend to community, affordability, tourism, and economic prosperity." T-Mobile awards up to \$50,000 for shovel-ready projects in small towns that foster connections, including outdoor spaces, the arts, community centers, local libraries, revitalizing historic buildings, and more. Proposals must include plans, budget, timeline, anticipated impact, and up to five letters of support. Elected officials, town managers/employees, tribal leaders, or nonprofit community leaders from small towns with population less than 50,000 can apply. Applications are accepted quarterly. NEW April 7, 2024 Main Street America Backing Small Businesses Grants. In partnership with American Express, this Main Street America grant program supports small businesses with \$10,000 grants for projects that grow or improve their businesses. At least 10% of the state's annual allocation from the National Park Service must be awarded to CLGs. Grant awards generally range from \$2,500 to \$35,000. NEW April 17/June 28, 2024 SC State Historical Records Advisory Board (SHRAB) Grant. SHRAB, with assistance from SCDAH, has been awarded \$80,000 in federal grant funds to conduct a historical records regrant project. Local governments, historical records repositories, and non-profits in SC that preserve and/or provide access to SC's historical records or support the state's archival community in education and training can apply for grant funding with special consideration to traditionally underserved institutions and collections, especially those focusing on SC African American and Native American history and rural areas of the state. The SHRAB is accepting Letters of Intent by April 17, 2024, and grant applications until June 28, 2024. Grant applicants are also required to attend a virtual Information Session. The grant guidelines, application and further information is available on the SCDAH website.

Monthly, SC Humanities Council Mini Grants. SC Humanities awards Mini Grants to support public humanities programs of modest cost, with awards of \$5,000 or less. Monthly, SC Humanities Council Planning Grants. SC Humanities awards Planning Grants to support preliminary work in designing a project that warrants detailed planning because of its length, scope, or cost. Awards are \$5,000 or less.
