2025 SC Historic Preservation Awards: Call for Nominations



Nominations are being accepted for the 2025 South Carolina Historic Preservation Awards. Sponsored by Preservation South Carolina, the SC Department of Archives and History, and the Office of the Governor, the Historic Preservation Awards recognize exceptional accomplishments in the preservation, rehabilitation, and interpretation of South Carolina's architectural and cultural heritage. The six award categories are: Honor Awards, Stewardship Awards, Preservation Service Awards, Heritage Tourism Award, Elected Official Honor Award, and Governor's Award. FY25 Federal Historic Preservation Fund Grant Applications Due May 1

Applications and instructions for the FY 2025 federal Historic Preservation Fund subgrants are now available at <u>this link</u>. Administered by the State Historic Preservation Office, these matching grants can assist two types of projects:

- *Survey and Planning Projects:* eligible projects include surveys of historic properties, National Register nominations, preservation education, and preservation planning.
- Stabilization Projects: eligible projects include stabilizing historic buildings or protecting historic buildings from the adverse effects of the weather. Stabilization Projects are limited to projects located in South Carolina's <u>Certified Local Government (CLG)</u> <u>communities</u>.

Any local government, non-profit, or institution in South Carolina may apply for a Survey and Planning Project. Local governments, non-profits and institutions located in a CLG community may also apply for a Stabilization Project. At least ten percent of the state's annual allocation from the National Park Service must be awarded to CLGs. Grant Applications will be accepted until 5:00 PM, May 1, 2025.

March 31, 2025 (Q1 2025 deadline) T-Mobile Hometown Grants. T-Mobile awards up to \$50,000 for shovel-ready projects in small towns that foster connections, including outdoor spaces, the arts, community centers, local libraries, revitalizing historic buildings, and more. Proposals must include plans, budget, timeline, anticipated impact, and up to five letters of support. Elected officials, town managers/employees, tribal leaders, or nonprofit community leaders from small towns with population less than 50,000 can apply. April 25, 2025 NEH Disaster Recovery Grants for Humanities Collections. The Chair of the National Endowment for the Humanities has issued an open call for applications for Chair's Disaster Recovery Grants for Humanities Collections, to humanities organizations that steward collections affected by Hurricane and Tropical Storm Helene and Hurricane Milton. Emergency response and recovery activities may include salvaging humanities collections such as rare books, documents, photographs, artwork, sculptures, historical objects, audiovisual media, and digital collections. Any local government, non-profit, or institution in South Carolina may apply for a Survey and Planning Project. Local governments, non-profits and institutions located in a CLG community may also apply for a Stabilization Project. At least 10% of the state's annual allocation from the National Park Service must be awarded to CLGs. Grant awards generally range from \$2,500 to \$35,000.
