South Carolina HBCUs Receive Preservation Grants

The State, Tribal, Local, Plans and Grants program of the National Park Service <u>recently awarded \$9.7 million</u> to 14 projects in ten states as part of the Historic Preservation Fund's Historically Black Colleges and Universities grant program, which focuses on the repair of historic structures on the campuses of Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). Four projects in South Carolina will receive grants:

- Morgan Hall, Benedict College
- Antisdel Chapel, Benedict College
- Coppin Hall, Allen University
- Wilkinson Hall, South Carolina State University

Grant Application Deadlines

June 1, 2023 National Trust Preservation Funds. Grants from the National Trust Preservation Funds encourage preservation at the local level by providing seed money for preservation projects and are awarded to nonprofit organizations and public agencies, with the majority of funds awarded to planning and education programs. Grants are awarded annually in three competitive rounds. For more information and how to apply visit https://savingplaces.org/grants#.XcBeJVVKjDA.4.

July 11, 2023 History of Equal Rights Grants Program. The National Park Service is now accepting applications for the <u>History of Equal Rights (HER) grant program</u>. Congress has appropriated \$5 million for the FY 2023 grants. Grant projects fund physical preservation or pre-preservation of sites associated with efforts to achieve

equal rights. The History of Equal Rights grants are not limited to any specific group and are intended to include the broadest possible interpretation of equal rights for any American.

July 18, 2023 Underrepresented Communities Grants. The National Park Service's <u>Underrepresented Communities Grant Program</u> (URC) is now accepting applications for FY2023 competitive grants. The National Park Service's Underrepresented Communities Grant Program (URC) works towards diversifying the nominations submitted to the National Register of Historic Places. Projects include surveys and inventories of historic properties associated with communities underrepresented in the National Register, as well as the development of nominations to the National Register for specific sites. Congress has appropriated \$1.25 million for the 2023 URC Grant Program.

August 9, 2023 SC Humanities Major Grants. Major Grants (up to \$15,000 effective July 1, 2023) support public programs designed to be accessible by a broad audience, to serve citizens in urban, rural, and small-town settings, and to make possible humanities programs that illuminate and enrich the lives of both audiences and scholars. Drafts are strongly encouraged and will be accepted any time prior to the deadline. Monthly, SC Humanities Council Mini Grants. SC Humanities awards Mini Grants to support public humanities programs of modest cost, with awards of \$2,500 or less. (Starting July 1, the maximum amount will be \$5,000.) Applications are reviewed monthly with deadlines on the first business day of the month. Monthly, SC Humanities Council Planning Grants. SC Humanities awards Planning Grants to support preliminary work in designing a project that warrants detailed planning because of its length, scope, or cost. Awards are \$2,500 or less. (Starting July 1, the maximum amount will be \$5,000.) Planning Grants are reviewed monthly with deadlines on the first business day of the month.
