### **Upcoming Grant Application Deadlines**

Monthly, The SC American Revolution Sestercentennial Commission (SC250) is accepting applications for FY26 Monthly Grants (up to \$15,000). SC250 also offers Major Grants (\$15,001 to \$125,000) and Premier Project Grants (\$125,001) with quarterly deadlines. December 1, 2025 SC SHRAB Microgrants Program. Using funding from the National

Historical Publications and Records Commission (NHPRC), the SC SHRAB will award up to \$1,000 each to 15 microgrant projects to provide non-competitive funding for capital support and/or essential needs purchases to benefit an archival program of South Carolina institutions housing historical records. SC SHRAB will provide funding for projects that support researcher access to their collections, including: Archival Supplies, Equipment, Furniture, and Software. There is no cost share for these microgrants. Eligible Institutions include: SC Historical Records Repositories, Local Governments, Professional Organizations, and Federally-acknowledged or state-recognized Native American tribes or groups. December 1, 2025 State Energy Office Mini-Grants Program. The US Department of Energy awarded funding to the Energy Office to fund several high-impact demonstration projects in the areas of energy efficiency, renewable energy, and clean transportation. Eligible applicants include state agencies, local governments, public colleges/universities/technical colleges, K-12 public schools, and non-profit organizations. The maximum award value will be \$50,000. Cost sharing is not required, but leveraging of funds is encouraged in order to maximize the energy-related benefits of a project. **NEW December 10, 2025 Lighthouse Preservation Grants**. The U.S. Lighthouse Society is accepting letters of interest for projects to be considered for one of the 2026 Lighthouse Preservation Grants. **NEW March 3, 2026 National Fund for Sacred Places**. The National Fund for Sacred Places provides technical and final support for congregations to build capacity to use and preserve historic houses of worship. The National Fund administers monies through planning grants, wrap-around training and technical assistance, and matching capital grants ranging from \$50,000 to \$500,000. **NEW Partners for Sacred Places Intervention Fund**, an emergency grant under the umbrella of the National Fund for Sacred Places that supports historic sacred places with building repair and recovery funds after an unanticipated emergency from extreme weather, property destruction, or urgent health and safety hazards.
