Job Opening at the South Carolina SHPO

The SC Department of Archives and History is currently accepting applications for a Historic Architecture Consultant in the State Historic Preservation Office. The position will manage the state historic tax credit program for homeowners, the Historic Preservation State Grant Fund, and conduct reviews of historic building projects for compliance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for a range of SHPO programs. Applications will be accepted until the closing date of October 29, 2023, after which the job may be re-posted as needed until filled.

Historic Preservation State Grant Fund Now Accepting Applications

The South Carolina Department of Archives & History is pleased to announce that the Historic Preservation State Grant Fund is accepting applications. The purpose of the State Grant Fund is to support historic preservation projects that benefit local communities through the physical repair and rehabilitation of South Carolina's historic buildings. Eligible applicants are nonprofit organizations [501(c)(3)], local governments, and federal or state recognized Native American tribes.

Grants ranging from \$40,000 to \$200,000 will be awarded to stabilization and weatherization projects of historic buildings. A minimum 20% cash match of the Total Project Cost is required. Buildings must be listed as a contributing resource in a National Register of Historic Places historic district or individually listed, or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. Project work must meet the <u>Secretary of the Interior's</u> <u>Standards for Rehabilitation</u>. The application deadline is December 31, 2023. National Park Service Issues New Guidance on the Use of Substitute Materials

<u>Preservation Brief 16: The Use of Substitute Materials on Historic Building Exteriors</u> has been updated and revised to address additional instances when the use of substitute materials may be appropriate and provides a path for decision-making in their use. The Brief also includes an expanded and updated list of various building features and potential substitute materials which may be considered for use as possible replacement materials, consistent with the Standards.

The Planning Successful Rehabilitation Projects related guidance, *Evaluating Substitute Materials in Historic Buildings*, has been similarly updated and revised.

Grant Application Deadlines

NEW December 19, 2023 Save America's Treasures Grants. The National Park Service is accepting applications for the <u>Save America's Treasures</u> (SAT) grant program. The SAT program provides preservation and conservation assistance to nationally significant historic sites and collections. \$26.5 million will be competitively awarded. A dollar-for-dollar, non-Federal match, is required, this can be either cash or documented in-kind services. SAT is administered by the National Park Service (NPS) in partnership with the <u>National Endowment for the Arts</u> (NEA), the <u>National Endowment for the Humanities</u> (NEH), and the <u>Institute of Museum and Library Services</u> (IMLS). Preservation projects fund physical preservation of historic buildings, sites, structures, and objects. Collection projects include conservation projects go to opportunity number P23AS00499. December 31, 2023 Historic Preservation State Grant Fund. Administered by the SC Department of Archives and History, the state-funded grant program will award grants ranging from \$40,000 to \$200,000 for the stabilization and weatherization of historic buildings in South Carolina. Eligible applications are nonprofit organizations, local governments, and federal or state recognized Native American tribes. A minimum 20% cash match of the Total Project Cost is required. Buildings must be listed as a contributing resource in a National Register of Historic Places historic district or individually listed in the National Register, or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. Project work must meet the <u>Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation</u>. January 17, 2024 The National Park Service's <u>Historically Black Colleges & Universities Grant Program</u> (HBCU) is now accepting applications for FY2023 competitive grants. HBCU grants are funded by the Historic Preservation Fund (HPF), administered by the NPS, and fund a broad range of pre-preservation planning activities and physical preservation work for historic sites that are listed in or eligible for listing in the <u>National Register of Historic Places</u> or as a <u>National Historic Landmark</u>. Congress has appropriated \$11 million for the HBCU Grant Program. For more information and to apply for the HBCU Grant Program visit Grants.gov: <u>P23AS00501</u>. Any accredited Historically Black Colleges & Universities are eligible to apply for funding. Monthly, SC Humanities Council Mini Grants. SC Humanities awards Mini Grants to support public humanities programs of modest cost, with awards of \$5,000 or less. Monthly, SC Humanities Council Planning Grants. SC Humanities awards Planning Grants to support preliminary work in designing a project that warrants detailed planning because of its length, scope, or cost. Awards are \$5,00 or less.
