Historic Preservation State Grant Fund Now Accepting Applications

The South Carolina Department of Archives & History is pleased to announce that the Historic Preservation State Grant Fund is accepting applications. The purpose of the State Grant Fund is to support historic preservation projects that benefit local communities through the physical repair and rehabilitation of South Carolina's historic buildings. Eligible applicants are nonprofit organizations [501(c)(3)], local governments, and federal or state recognized Native American tribes.

Grants ranging from \$40,000 to \$200,000 will be awarded to stabilization and weatherization projects of historic buildings. A minimum 20% cash match of the Total Project Cost is required. Buildings must be listed as a contributing resource in a National Register of Historic Places historic district or individually listed, or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. Project work must meet the <u>Secretary of the Interior's</u> <u>Standards for Rehabilitation</u>. The application deadline is December 31, 2023. State Board of Review Approves 5 Nominations

The State Board of Review for the National Register of Historic Places met on Friday, July 28, 2023 at the SC Archives & History Center in Columbia. The Board approved the following nominations:

- Pleasant Grove School, Alcolu, Clarendon County
- Borden Ice Cream Factory, Greenville, Greenville County
- Greenville Pepsi-Cola Bottling Plant, Greenville vicinity, Greenville County
- Sims High School, Union, Union County

The SHPO has forwarded the nominations to the Keeper of the National Register at the National Park Service in Washington, DC who makes the final decision about listing the properties in the National Register. Phillips Community Listed in the National Register of Historic Places

The Phillips Community Historic District in Mount Pleasant was listed in the National Register of Historic Places on September 7, 2023. This is the first place in South Carolina to be listed as a Traditional Cultural Place (TCP), with Phillips being listed for its association with Gullah Geechee culture. The 415 acre district is a remarkable example of an intact postbellum rural freedmen's community, retaining settlement patterns, historic landscape features, and original plat lines that have defined the community for over a century. It represents the self-sufficiency and self-reliance of Black rural communities in the wake of the Civil War and their efforts to maintain autonomy and freedom through agricultural practices. Today, approximately 85% of the residents within the Phillips Community descend from the original Black farmers who occupied and purchased the lots during the Reconstruction era and maintain core aspects of regional Gullah culture through agriculture, commerce, and social and religious customs.

Grant Application Deadlines

October 1, 2023 National Trust Preservation Funds. Grants from the National Trust Preservation Funds encourage preservation at the local level by providing seed money for preservation projects and are awarded to nonprofit organizations and public agencies. The majority of funds are awarded to planning and education programs. Grants are awarded annually in three competitive rounds. October 10, 2023 African American Civil Rights Grants Program. The African American Civil Rights Grant

<u>Program</u> (AACR) assists projects that document, interpret, and preserve sites and stories telling the full story of African American civil rights. There are two separate grant funding opportunities, the AACR History Grants and AACR Preservation Grants. AACR Grants are funded by the Historic Preservation Fund (HPF), administered by the

NPS, and will fund a broad range of preservation projects including survey and inventory, National Register nominations, oral histories and more. Grants are awarded through a competitive process and do not require non-Federal funding match. Congress has appropriated \$24 million in FY2023 funding for History and Preservation projects. NEW December 31, 2023 Historic Preservation State Grant Fund. Administered by the SC Department of Archives and History, the state-funded grant program will award grants ranging from \$40,000 to \$200,000 for the stabilization and weatherization of historic buildings in South Carolina. Eligible applications are nonprofit organizations, local governments, and federal or state recognized Native American tribes. A minimum 20% cash match of the Total Project Cost is required. Buildings must be listed as a contributing resource in a National Register of Historic Places historic district or individually listed in the National Register, or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. Project work must meet the <u>Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation</u>. SC Humanities awards Planning Grants to support preliminary work in designing a project that warrants detailed planning because of its length, scope, or cost. Awards are \$5,00 or less.
