Call for Proposals

The South Carolina African American Heritage Commission invites interested individuals/groups to submit proposals for the 2025 SCAAHC Annual Conference, scheduled for Saturday February 22, 2025 at the SC Archives & History Center in Columbia. Panels will cover a wide array of topics related to African American history, culture, and heritage across South Carolina. This year's planned thematic panels are:

- Food and Foodways in South Carolina: the importance and role of food in South Carolina's African American history, heritage, and culture
- Reconstruction Era: topics focusing on the role of reconstruction era politics, legislation, churches, religion, and/or education in South Carolina
- Gender and Resistance: research exploring African American women's roles in resistance and social movements throughout South Carolina's history
- Student Research: current projects by students researching topics related to African American history, heritage and culture
- Place Making and Reclaiming Black Spaces: case studies and reports on projects completed by organizations to preserve the history and legacy of historically African American spaces

Other topics may be considered, but should be directly related to the involvement and impact of African American people in South Carolina. Presentations should be interactive and, if applicable, provide strategies and solutions that attendees can apply in their own communities or organizations. Presenters will have 20 minutes each with 15 minutes total for Q&A. Proposals may be combined with other proposed sessions when appropriate. Up to three (3) speakers per session will have their conference registration face waived.

Presenters at all phases of their career are encouraged to submit proposals, including undergraduate students, graduate students, independent scholars, organizational leaders, etc.

Recent African American Preservation News


Nathaniel Russell Kitchen Restoration

Archaeological excavations of the Nathaniel Russell Kitchen House are under way and is considered a crucial phase in learning more about the enslaved people who inhabited the house. The excavations have revealed historical materials like large fragments of porcelain plates, Edgefield pottery made by enslaved potters, an African carnelian bead (see right), and more. Grants!

• The Unity Cemetery Preservation Fund: The Unity Cemetery Preservation fund provides support for the preservation of historic (dating from ~1800 to ~1900) African American cemeteries. Funds can be used for a variety of projects including: mapping, site assessment, and other data collection; conservation treatments for grace markers and other funerary features; landscape stabilization; and public outreach. The deadline is February 28, 2025 and more information can be found on their webpage.

CALL FOR PROPOSALS

We are accepting proposals for Speaker Sessions for the 2025 historic preservation conference, scheduled for **Friday**, **April 25, 2025** at the **SC Archives & History Center** in Columbia. Speaker Sessions can cover a variety of historic preservation topics, and range in difficulty from "Historic Preservation 101" to discussions of emerging issues. Top interests include:

- Case studies of successful historic preservation projects
- Historic preservation technology / how-tos
- Preservation funding: grants, tax credits, easements
- Historic preservation advocacy
- Local government / local design review topics
- Preservation of African American historic places
- Sustainability, adaptation and climate resiliency for historic places
- · Cemeteries: protection, care, or documentation
- How to research historic properties
- Economic and community revitalization programs
- Programs to preserve historic places and sites
 South Carolina architectural history and archaeology
- South Carolina architectural history and archaeology

Other topics may be considered, but should directly relate to the preservation of historic buildings, sites, places, and structures. A session should be interactive and include strategies or solutions that attendees can apply in their own communities or organizations. Plan on 40 - 45 minutes for your presentation and 5 - 10 minutes for questions and answers. Session proposals may be combined with other proposed sessions when appropriate. Up to three (3) speakers per session will have their conference registration fees waived.


