- 2022: SCAAHC Member, Dr. Vernon Burton was awarded the John Hope Franklin Lifetime Achievement Award by the Southern Historical Association for his outstanding contributions to the field of Southern History.
- 2022: SCAAHC Member, Dr. Rhondda R. Thomas received the SC Humanities' Fresh Voices Governor's Award.
- 2022: SCAAHC Member, Dr. Vernon Burton was inducted into the Martin Luther King Jr. Collegium of Scholars at Morehouse College.
- 2020: Published the fourth edition of <u>A Teacher's Guide to African American Historic Places in</u> <u>South Carolina</u>.
