## A NOTE ON THE INDEX

The following rules have been adopted for the index:

1. Proper names are entered according to the most frequent spelling in the text.
2. Forenames abbreviated in the text are given in full unless the meaning of the abbreviation is doubtful.
3. Omitted forenames are supplied whenever they can be determined.
4. Each name occurring in a combination has a cross reference to the name of the combination.
5. Military titles are omitted unless they are necessary to identify the person named.
6. The names and titles of civil officers are separately entered with cross references in appropriate cases.
7. Names of Indians are identified either by the name of the tribe (e. g., Catawba) to which they belong, or the phrase, "an Indian." In the case of a "Savanah Indian" name, both identifying words follow the name. If an Indian has more than one name or title mentioned in the text, each name or title is entered with cross references to the one most frequently used.
8. Names of confederated Indian tribes (e. g., Creek Indians) have cross references to each tribe (e. g., Coosaw Indians) in the confederation.
9. Indian towns are entered separately and identified according to tribe by cross references to the group entry made for the towns of each tribe (e. g., Cherokee towns).
10. Names of places outside South Carolina are identified as to location if they are likely to be confused with others of the same name.
11. Names of ships are enclosed in quotation marks and followed by the definite article.
12. Common names are entered according to the modern spelling except in cases where an archaic form (e. g., How) occurs, there is a cross reference from the modern form (Hoe) to the archaic.
13. Collective names (e. g., Indian traders) have cross references to related groups (e. g., Cherokee traders). In a case like the entry, Goods in the Indian trade, which has only cross references to other entries, the purpose is to indicate the goods of the trade and related subjects.
14. All South Carolina entries, such as the Council, Commons House of Assembly, Creek Agent, Inhabitants of the colony, Rangers, and others, are entered separately, except references to the following: the agent to distribute Indian presents, commissions, currency, defense against Indian attacks, forts proposed for Cherokee settlements, government, Indian affairs, laws, regulation of Indian trade, relations with various Indian tribes, relations with the other colonies, and taxes, which are indexed under the entry, South Carolina.
15. All documents in the text are listed in the Calendar (pp. xiii-xxii). Each is also indexed under the name of the author and recipient, if any. In the case of the subentry, "talks," a distinction is made between those written for Indians by traders and those given orally to the Governor in conference. The former are entered as "talks' from" the Indians, and the latter as "talks' of" the Indians.

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
